## Mystery at the Museum

Those of you who came to see our 'in conversation' with James Norton at the beginning of December will recall that he was inspired to pursue a career in acting by a stint on work experience here in his mid-teens. Those

early years of someone's
life are so important in
forming the adult, and
we'd like to think that
our various youth
theatre groups play a
part, small or large, in
that process.

We have groups for children as young as five

(Drama Club, for school years 1 to 6) and for young people into their mid-teens (Youth Theatre for years 7 to 10), and under the leadership of Head of Creative Engagement, Rob Salmon, they all come together once a year to perform a very special show under the umbrella title of Youth Arts Festival.

This year, around 70 young actors from tinies to teens will join on our stage next month to

perform Mystery at the Museum, a new show written and directed by Rob.

Things have been going missing at the Museum. The woolly mammoth has wandered off, the Grecian urns are nowhere to be seen, and King Tut's beard is a thing of the past! Join Detective Davies and his hapless assistant Archie to get to the bottom of it all before there's nothing left.

Judging by last year's inaugural Youth Arts Festival production, Nurse, the Screens!, it'll be a joyful occasion – and who knows, you might just spot the next James Norton!



You can see Mystery at the Museum at 7.30pm on Wednesday 12 and Thursday 13 February – tickets are just £6 each.

## Love's Labour's Lost (more or less)

We're about to go into rehearsals for our next foray into Shakespeare – Love's Labour's Lost (more or less).

That bit in brackets is dually important. First, it will hopefully link it in your minds to our coproduction, with Shakespeare North Playhouse, of The Comedy of Errors (more or less) back in the spring of 2023. That show was a huge hit, bringing in new audiences and people booking to see it again and again – which is why we wanted to get the team back together again. Secondly, it should remind you that this show – another co-pro with Shakespeare North – is Shakespeare, but not necessarily as you know it! Adaptors Elizabeth Godber and Nick Lane have taken the Bard's basic plot, along with some of his text, and updated it all to the 1990s,

complete with a liberal sprinkling of fabulously upbeat '90s songs.

You'll find all the characters you know and love – Armado, Moth, Dull, Costard, Berowne, et al – and a storyline that's faithful(ish) to the original: a king and three noble friends vow to avoid women but end up falling in love with a princess and, yes, her three friends. There are many misunderstandings on the way, including a series of hilariously misdirected letters, but it all ends happily a year later.

In our version, we've lost the kingliness and just have four ordinary blokes heading to Ibiza for a stag weekend, having reluctantly agreed with the bride-to-be's father that they will forswear the company of women for the duration. But things go awry when the hen and her friends, who were meant to be in Menorca, are redirected to Ibiza...



We're delighted to welcome back to our stage Linford Johnson (Alf in Alan Ayckbourn's The Girl Next Door back in 2021); David Kirkbride (Antipholus of both Scarborough and Prescott in The Comedy of Errors (more or less)); Annie Kirkman (Maloria in our UK Theatre Awardwinning Christmas 2023 show, Beauty and the Beast, and Dracula in last summer's Dracula: The Bloody Truth), and Alyce Liburd (Adriana In The Comedy of Errors (more or less) and Mina in Dracula: The Bloody Truth).

Joining them are four actors new to our company (although you may remember Alice from Northern Broadsides' *Quality Street* in 2023): Thomas Cotran, Alice Imelda, Timothy Adam Lucas and Jo Patmore.

Love's Labour's Lost (more or less) promises to be at least as much fun as The Comedy of Errors (more or less) – don't miss it!! It rehearses here, then opens at Shakespeare North Playhouse, playing from 28 February to 22 March. It then comes home and is in our Round from 27 March to 19 April.

#### Fun fact:

The original text of Love's Labour's Lost includes the longest single word in any of Shakespeare's plays:

## honorificabilitudinitatibus

We've chosen not to include it in our adaptation, not least because we didn't think it was fair to expect Linford, who plays Costard, to say it every show!

#### February treats

We've got a cornucopia of theatrical delights to brighten up February for you:

**Bull** (1 February)

From Mike Bartlett, the writer of the hit TV show Doctor Foster starring Suranne Jones, Bull has garnered some rave reviews in its time. The Observer's Susannah Clapp



described it as 'riveting and really uncomfortable', while Michael Billington in The Guardian said: "It makes for a gripping 55-minute spectacle... a mixture of bear pit and boxing ring [which] turns us into voyeuristic accomplices."

Both (tough!) critics gave *Bull* four stars. With reviews like that, we'll forgive the show, an incisive piece about workplace bullying, for beating Alan Ayckbourn's *Surprises* to the 2013 Best New Play at The UK Theatre Awards!

#### Last Rites (8 February)

Another powerful piece of theatre which has gained four- and five-star reviews from many different publications. The Stage praised its 'powerful physical storytelling', The Guardian called it 'sumptuous' and 'tremendous', The Scotsman loved its 'mighty theatrical lyricism' and according to The Reviews Hub, it's 'a triumph... as real, raw and beautiful as it gets'.

Performed by Ramesh
Meyyappan, the show

combines exciting physical, non-verbal storytelling with dynamic projection and an immersive soundtrack that can be felt and heard. Told through a Deaf man's unique perspective, it tells the

passionate and poignant story of a complex relationship cut short. Travelling from the UK to India, Arjun needs to carry out his father's funeral rites. But how can he perform an ancient Hindu practice that was never passed on? In life, his father wouldn't learn sign language, but in death Arjun needs to find a way to say goodbye. He creates his own intimate, final ceremony that brings to life a rich tapestry of shared memories.

#### Crane ahoy!


If you passed our way at the beginning of last week, you might have noticed something a little out of the ordinary ... a giant crane, to be exact!
