



### Honk!

Talking of spring incoming, this April marks our 30th year in this building (and, coincidentally, the building itself will turn 90 on 28 March!). Those of you who remember the 90s might recall one of our earlier productions, the joyous musical Honk!



We world premiered this delightful show by George Stiles and Anthony Drewe, and it's since gone on to over 8,000 productions across the world and won many awards, including the Olivier for Best Musical in 2000 – so what better way to celebrate a couple of big birthdays than to revisit it?

Ugly looks quite a bit different from his darling duckling brothers and sisters. The other animals on the farm are quick to notice and point this out, despite his mother's protective flapping. Feeling rather foul about himself, the little fowl finds himself on an adventure of self-discovery, all the while unknowingly outwitting a very hungry Cat. Along the way, Ugly meets a whole flock of unique characters and finds out that being different is not a bad thing to be.

If the story sounds familiar, it's because it's based on the life-affirming story by Hans Christian Andersen.

We'll be presenting Honk! In concert on the afternoon of Sunday 12 April\* as a fundraiser. All money raised will go towards our New Work Fund, helping us to put new work on our stages and nurture new talent (we are a registered charity, number 253606). *Glitch: The True Story of the Post Office Scandal* (6 & 7 February): **There are limited tickets available** for this play based on the real-life story of Berkshire sub-postmaster, Pam Stubbs, as she finds herself caught in the Horizon Post Office scandal.

## Spotlight on... Sam Freeman

Sam Freeman, who brings his show *We're Not Getting a Dog* to us on Tuesday 24 February, grew up in Scarborough and attended Newby Primary and Scalby Secondary schools, and Scarborough Sixth Form College.

His first stage appearance was here, in *An Honest Trade*, and the first show he wrote (for Rounders, our youth group at the time) was *Three Cheers for HRH*.

He says: "I grew up wanting to be Alan Ayckbourn (which, when you think about it, is weird) or Tim Firth."



Sam also worked front of house at the SJT for around two years, and you may also have seen him play music locally – he was in the EASY Band.

*We're Not Getting a Dog (A Story Largely Not About Dogs)* is a storytelling show: Sam says his shows are a mix between a BBC Radio 4 Radio Drama and a live audio book. We asked him to tell us a bit more about it...

*"It started when I found myself recently writing really worthy stories and, frankly, they were selling horrifically poorly (particularly in Wolverhampton). So I decided I'd write something slightly more populist, but unfortunately (yet again), that's not really happened. You see, I fully intended on writing a show about dogs – it was going to be in the first person, I even researched man-sized dog costumes and building a set that included a giant dog basket. But then as I was writing, what emerged was something different. It morphed into a story about finding your place, about love, and finding a home. Which was lucky because costumes and giant dog baskets are crazy expensive for a 6ft man."*

**So how do you write your shows?**

*"I have a notebook of ideas – some single words, others full pages or scribblings – and I wait for something to feel*

***"I even researched man-sized dog costumes"***

right. Sometimes I'll write one, 10, maybe even 30 pages and then realise it's just not me, or I've accidentally re-written the plot to Star Wars or The Godfather. When an idea feels right and flows as I write it then I power through and write a big first draft – usually around 20,000 words in total – then I cut it down by half and yeah, a show (I hope).

"Cutting material is really depressing in a way, but I tend to keep everything – so, for example, around 3,000 words from this show will become something else. Seven words in this show are outtakes from my first show, curiously."

## Do you like dogs?

"I'll be honest, I never used to. I think I was a little afraid of them. Whereas now I think they'd kind of incredible – they have an honesty that's great."

## Did you have a list of reasons not to get a dog?

"Yes. I wrote several. It was mostly the obvious stuff – picking up poo/lifestyle choices/responsibility/picking up poo. It was a fairly rock-solid list apart from one fairly major flaw: my partner really wanted a dog. I think the list made sure my eyes were very open and made me really aware that I want to be sure that if I am getting a dog, then I want them to live the best possible life, and that means compromise for me. Turns out that compromise has only been positives. But it's also worth saying: the show's now mostly not about dogs."
