

Spotlight on... Flamenco Origenes

Here's something new forus - flamenco! This

November, experience this passionate and dramatic art form at close quarters in our Round.

The show is performed by a company founded by Lourdes Fernandez, who began dancing when she was five years old. Since then, her whole life has

been dedicated to flamenco. She studied dance at the Madrid Conservatory, graduated at Rey Juan Carlos University and completed her



Masters in Performing Arts. She also taught dance at the American Saint Louis University of Madrid and participated in the International Dance Gala for UNESCO.

Flamenco Orígenes is a unique celebration of the roots of flamenco, embracing the influences that have defined its soul.

The show blends expressive guitar strumming, soulful singing, captivating dance, enchanting violin melodies, and mesmerising percussion to create a cultural journey that transcends boundaries and captures the essence of flamenco's historical evolution. It's more than a



performance; it's an immersive exploration of the art form's deep heritage.

Just a reminder that a lot of our shows do sell out in advance, so it pays to book sooner than later.

Backstage secrets – like a rolling stone...

Our Company Stage manager, Fleur Beeley, writes:


As I've mentioned before in this column, attention to detail from all departments involved in the making of a show has to be pinpoint accurate, especially in the Round. As members of the audience, you can be sitting centimetres away from the set, a costume or a prop.

We like to go the extra mile – even if we don't think anyone will notice! However, something has been noticed recently by quite a few eagle-eyed customers, so I thought I would let you in on its secret.

In Earth Angel, part of the set is the outside of the front door of a suburban home. Along with meticulously weathering the hand-painted brick, our fabulous scenic artist, Julia Wray, has littered the nooks and crannies of the brickwork with moss.



You can get all sorts of moss, fake and real, but we like to use something called Norwegian reindeer moss (which is technically a lichen – you learn something new every day!).



It comes in a multitude of colours and as it's natural, it still has spongy movement and can be walked on without being 'crackly'. It gives a much more natural look than painting alone, and as you lot are so close, it has to look completely authentic!
