### Keynote Panel



#### **Jess Thom (she/her)**

Writer, artist and activist Jess Thom co-founded Touretteshero in 2010 as a creative response to her experience of living with Tourette's Syndrome. Jess campaigns for disability rights and social justice and is on a mission to change the world 'one tic at a time.' A multi-award-winning BAFTA nominated performer, Jess has toured the world with sell out stage shows, stand-up comedy, keynotes speeches and public appearances. Touretteshero is a proudly disabled-led organisation with an established reputation for creativity and making change across sectors. Jess frequently contributes to academic papers, interviews, and podcasts, to remove barriers and push for greater equality.



#### **Toni-Dee (she/they)**

Toni-Dee is an independent artist and theatre maker working across form, a writer (In Other Words, Field Notes), workshop leader, facilitator, collaborator and 'thinker-in-the room'. Her current body of work, made with 'infectious warmth' (Exeunt) is a series of performances & installations made for cemeteries, refugee centres, kitchens, churches and theatres. Outside of her artistic practice, Toni facilitates new approaches to care and wellbeing for other artists, is Associate Director at Selina Thompson Ltd & Associate Artist of award winning company One Tenth Human making intricate, intimate, and wildly entertaining live imaginative events for children and families. Toni also facilitates part-mutual-care-part-art making-part-activism project Balmy Army and is a Trustee of Leeds based International performance festival Transform.



#### **Danielle Daglan - Head of Culture North Yorkshire Council (she/her)**

Danielle is the Head of Culture and Archives at North Yorkshire Council and has recently led on a new cultural strategy for the new combined North Yorkshire authority. She has over twenty years' experience in the cultural sector working across arts, heritage and museums within charitable trusts, national development agencies and with/for local authorities.



**Chair: Sophie Drury - Bradey - Co-Artistic Director & CEO, ARCADE (she/her)**

Before co-founding ARCADE, Sophie was Senior Producer for 10 years at Battersea Arts Centre. **Jason Wilsher-Mills (he/him)**

Jason's work celebrates disability, his northern working-class heritage & popular culture, through cutting edge technologies and brightly coloured, large scale humorous, but challenging art. "When asked what my work is about, I simply say – Think 'I, Daniel Blake' meets 'The Beano'". Jason uses both digital media and traditional media to create the work, which is brightly coloured and psychedelic, employing a palette inspired by the childhood comic books he read in the 1970s. Stewart Baxter is an experimental composer, musician and visual artist from Hull where he has built a studio with his band LIFE, and a creative space for his company Hinterland Creative and local artists. Stewart works as an art director within the music industry and runs the Hull Music Net music development project.



### **Chiedu Oraka (he/him)**

A leading figure in the Northern Rap and Grime scene Chiedu Oraka, aka 'The Black Yorkshireman' defies genres with his blend of raw honesty and social poetry. Raised on North Hull Estate, his bars fill the dancefloor as capably as they serve to portray the Black, working-class experience from the frontlines of a largely white, economically deprived region of the north. 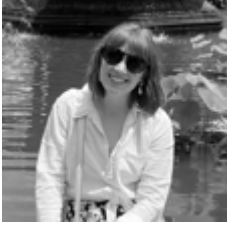

**Workshop / Talk: Making Work With Young People**

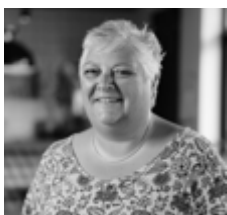

**Workshop / Talk: Making Work With Young People**

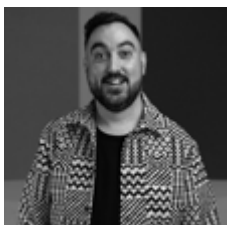

**Workshop / Talk: Inclusive Theatre-Making**

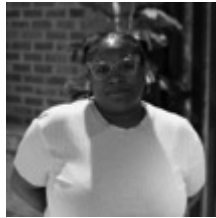
