Productions!

In 2024 alone, we staged **293 performances** on our theatre stages including **45 visiting shows** across **67 performances** - bringing a wide range of
stories and experiences to our audiences.

At our very heart lies **our unique round stage**, the very first theatre-in-the-round in Britain and one of only a handful across the UK. Its 404 seats surround the stage, creating unforgettable intimacy between audience and performer; stories are lived, not just watched. Behind the scenes, incredible innovation supports this magic: a purposebuilt stage lift allows sets to glide easily into place, while a pioneering trampoline-style mesh above the stage lets technicians work safely and invisibly. This blend of intimacy and ingenuity makes the Round a true treasure, a place where memories are made and shared.

We're also committed to making theatre as accessible as possible, creating **28** accessible performances, including BSL interpreted, relaxed, audio described and captioned shows - 24 of them our own productions, and four from **Frozen Light**, a company creating multi-sensory theatre for audiences with profound and multiple learning disabilities (PMLD).

From set and costume design, to props and lighting, a gift from your will could fund an entire production or add that extra sparkle we wouldn't have been able to include otherwise. It allows us to dream bigger and bolder, crafting unforgettable shared experiences in the way only live theatre can.

Your support means we can keep inspiring local communities through creative projects and sharing the magic of live theatre with audiences near and far.



New writing and talent development

Our founder, Stephen Joseph, was passionate about theatre-in-the-round and new writing. He believed everyone should have the opportunity to create and tell their story, and his legacy continues to this day.

Now an internationally renowned theatre, many new writers have been nurtured here over the years, including Stephen Mallatratt, Tim Firth, Vanessa Brooks, Fiona Evans, Sarah Phelps, and of course, our now Director Emeritus, Sir Alan Ayckbourn.

We're proud to be a home for bold, original voices, championing and staging new writers and writing, from full-length productions like **These Majestic** Creatures and The Whitby Rebels, to script-in-hand playreadings and R&D support for artists.

Our work's been recognised with honours including **UK Theatre Awards** and Writers' Guild Awards, but our greatest achievement is the artists and stories we've helped bring to life, like acclaimed production **Build a Rocket**. This powerful play began its journey right here in Scarborough and went on to win Holden Street Theatres' Edinburgh Fringe Award, the Sunday Mail Best Female Solo Show Award and Adelaide Fringe Best Theatre Award when it travelled across the globe to Australia.

Since his journey began in Scarborough, Alan Ayckbourn has entrusted us with the debuts of nearly all his full-length plays. So far, over 80 have premiered here, spanning venues from the original Library Theatre to our modern SJT stage. This extraordinary partnership underscores not just our role as a venue, but as the creative birthplace of his astonishing legacy.

Our **Associate Director scheme** has nurtured exceptional theatre-makers who have gone on to shape stages across the UK: Chantell Walker brings her dynamic vision and commitment to community-focused, physically expressive theatre, while past associates have also made remarkable strides: Kash Arshad has directed The Jungle Book and Around the World in 80 Days, both of which were critically acclaimed; Lotte Wakeham went on to become Artistic Director of the Octagon Theatre Bolton; and Chelsey Gillard now leads the **Torch Theatre** in Milford Haven, championing contemporary work and diverse audiences. Collectively, they exemplify the scheme's role in fostering talent, innovation, and new voices in British theatre.

Acclaimed playwright Kat Rose-Martin works with us through the Playwrights '73 scheme, developing new work for our stages including Christmas show for under 6s, Wonkey Donkey and the Magic Christmas Carrot.

And talking of Christmas... have you ever visited Scarbolopolis? Or perhaps Scarboresia? Every festive season, the SJT transforms Scarborough into a world of wonder with a brand-new show written by Nick Lane. These

playful productions take a fast and funny twist on classic tales, reimagining them right here on our doorstep. Packed with nods to local places, shops and faces that our audiences know and love, they're all about bringing families together to laugh, cheer and celebrate. It just wouldn't be Christmas in

Scarborough without it.

We want to keep the door open for fresh stories and perspectives, and you can make this possible. With your support, we can champion the next generation of theatre-makers for decades to come.

Leaving a legacy, changing a life

Theatre is about connection, and we reach out to thousands of people across our community.

Across 2024, we welcomed 1,139 audience members with access requirements and made 944 tickets available for just £1 through our partner organisations North Yorkshire Council, Eastfield PACT, Beyond Housing, Carers Plus Yorkshire, Scarborough Survivors, Yorkshire Coast Families, Westway Open Arms and The Rainbow Centre.

At Christmas, we worked with Westway Open Arms to bring over 100 Eastfield residents to see Aladdin and provided 300 tickets for FEAST - North Yorkshire Council's school holiday scheme, offering free theatre places and a hot meal for children receiving benefits-related free school meals.

We're proud to be dementia-friendly, working closely with our local **Dementia Action Alliance** and people living with dementia to make theatre welcoming for all. Across 2024, we staged **five dementia-friendly theatre performances** and hosted **252 accessible film screenings**, ensuring that everyone, whatever their

dementia-friendly movement sessions, have clear dementia-friendly wayfinding signs throughout the building, and integrate captions in all our dementia-friendly performances.

The Meeting Point

Our former OutReach offices on Northway have been transformed into **The Meeting Point**, a vibrant new venue for community engagement, youth and family work, and small events. Open to non-profit activities during the week and available for a small donation on evenings and weekends, the space has expanded our Creative Engagement programme and made it more visible to the public.

Users include North Yorkshire Council, The Bridge Project with Adoption UK, unaccompanied asylum seekers, Scarborough, Whitby & Ryedale Mind, Mencap, the National Literacy Trust's Story Maker programme, Brownies, dementia-friendly movement classes, Home Instead Community Café sessions, Fuse Youth Theatre, Mind's Volunteering for Good and Creative Spaces programmes, local actors' groups and Scarborough Sixth Form College.

Through this wide-ranging activity, The Meeting Point supports creativity, learning, and community connection for people of all ages and backgrounds.

In the community

From running youth

In 2024/5, they delivered an incredible 1,021 workshops, working with 3,992 individual participants and creating 27,057 opportunities to take part – and there's so much more work to do.

Here at the SJT, creativity thrives through our youth theatre and programmes like Story Maker and FUSE. Story Maker, in partnership with the National Literacy Trust, inspires children to develop their story telling skills and confidence through fun, hands-on activities. Meanwhile. FUSE - our inclusive theatre group for young people with additional needs or in mainstream education - provides opportunities to explore performance and develop technical skills. Together, these programmes give young people a platform to express themselves and build important skills.



Young Company

Launched in 2023, the Young Company gives 16-25-year-olds the chance to develop their theatre skills through workshops and annual productions in the Round. Their debut DNA and follow-up Education. Education, Education earned critical acclaim, drew large audiences, and showcased the talent of emerging theatre-makers. Graduates have gone on to study at institutions such as LAMDA and Guildford School of Acting, while the programme continues to inspire young people by reflecting their experiences on stage and opening pathways into the arts.

Projects in Eastfield

Since 2023, we've built long-term partnerships with schools and community groups in Eastfield, embedding creative opportunities that are meaningful and relevant to local children. Our programmes include after-school drama clubs. year-round workshops, and collaborative projects like Listened To, connecting students and resident theatre makers. Beyond Eastfield, we deliver drama clubs, workshops, and industry days across Scarborough, North Yorkshire, and the East Riding, reaching communities across a 50mile radius. This approach really shows the power of creativity when it feels truly rooted in the community. **Keane Liley**, a member of our **Young Company** and former **George Pindar** pupil, created his one-man

show Battleground to portray life growing up in a community often misunderstood. Performed to Year 9

students at his former school, it combined honesty, humour, and resilience, leaving a lasting impression and

earning praise from the principal as "a very special moment".

Keane's follow-up play, Feral, premiered at the 2025 **Scarborough Fringe Festival** and went on to win

Best Theatre Production and the Chris Mellor Award for New Writing,

highlighting the power of creative engagement to nurture talent and inspire communities.

This is just one of the many amazing stories made possible through our commitment to nurturing emerging talent.

With your support, we can continue to invest in young people, amplify unheard voices, and give future generations the confidence and tools to shape their own stories.



Keeping the theatre running

In 1996, we found a new home in Scarborough's iconic Odeon cinema. It's a beautiful, historic building, but like any 90-year-old Grade II listed site, it needs care to preserve its features and remain fully accessible, with ongoing maintenance keeping lifts, hearing loops, the equipment needed for captioned and audio-described

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performances, taps, toilets - and much more! - running smoothly.

Much of our theatre was created in 1996, so everything is starting to need upgrading at the same time! Take our innovative stage lift for example: it's been a loyal workhorse for 30 years, but it now needs a modern control system to keep it safe and reliable. We're also midway through a major lighting transformation, replacing our old tungsten lamps with flexible LED systems that not only make our productions shine even brighter, but also reduce our energy use.

One of our most extraordinary features is above your head in the Round: our incredible mesh, a web of wires that's redefined how we work. Installed when we moved from Westwood, it allows our technicians to reach lighting safely and efficiently - a world away from the old days of ladders and long, tiring shifts.

Pioneering in the UK, the mesh remains a game-changer for productions, but like everything, it needs very careful maintenance. In 2024, we replaced a third of the mesh wires at a cost of £15,000, but after 30 years of heavy use, a full replacement would secure the stage's safety and flexibility for generations to come.

In 2025, we began the sizeable task of replacing our outdated heating and cooling systems – a vital upgrade for the comfort of everyone who visits the theatre. But it's not just the big projects that matter: we also need to focus on the smaller things, like keeping auditorium seats, dressing rooms, the Green Room, bar areas, and toilets in excellent condition. Every element of the theatre needs careful maintenance to ensure a welcoming, safe, and enjoyable experience for audiences, performers and staff.

Leaving us a gift in your will – what you need to know

Leaving just 1% in your will to the SJT could make a huge difference and help save tax on what you leave.

What will my gift support?

It's up to you! If you'd like your legacy gift to support a particular area of our work, we'd love you to specify that in a supporting letter and we'll follow your wishes as closely as possible.

If you're equally happy for us to use your gift where the need's greatest, you can write 'unrestricted' to allow us to focus funds where they're most needed.

Should I let you know I'm leaving a gift?

You don't have to let us know if you've left us a gift in your will, but we'd love you to so we can say thank you! If you wish to be anonymous, let us know and we'll ensure your intentions to leave us a gift remain completely private.

What else do I need to know about leaving a gift?

Scarborough Theatre Trust Ltd is a registered charity (**no. 253606**), meaning your legacy gift will be exempt from Inheritance Tax.

For example, if you decided to leave 10% of your will to charity, the Inheritance Tax rate on the rest of your will may reduce from 40% to 36%. We always recommend you seek advice from your financial or legal adviser, as we can't give legal advice.

If you decide to make a gift to us, you can choose to leave either a share of the residue of your estate (a residuary bequest) or a fixed amount (a pecuniary bequest).

What kind of gift can I leave?

A **residuary gift** is a share of your estate after all other payments have been made. One of the benefits of leaving a residuary gift is that it maintains its percentage value over time.

If this is your intention, you may find the following wording helpful:

I/We give all/a share of [please state fraction/percentage] of the residue of our/my estate to Scarborough Theatre Trust Ltd, of Westborough, Scarborough, Y011 IJW (Registered Charity Number 253606 and hereinafter called the SJT), to be applied for the general purposes of the SJT, and I/we direct that the receipt of a proper officer for the time being of the SJT shall be a complete discharge to my/our Executors.

A **pecuniary gift** is a fixed sum of money.

If this is your intention, you may find this wording helpful:

I/We give to Scarborough Theatre Trust Ltd, of Westborough, Scarborough, Y011 IJW (Registered Charity Number 253606 and hereinafter called the SJT), to be applied for the general purposes of the SJT, the sum of [amount in figures, amount in words] and I/we direct that the receipt of a proper officer for the time being of the SJT shall be a complete discharge to my/our Executors.

I'm leaving you a gift in my will but I'd like to stay anonymous.

A few fun facts...

We were the first theatre-in-the-round in Britain! When we opened in 1955 in a room above Scarborough Library, we became the UK's first professional theatre-in-the-round.

We've hosted the world premieres of **more than 80 of Alan Ayckbourn's plays** over eight consecutive decades.

SJT Youth Theatre alumni include *Downton Abbey* and *Coronation Street*'s Joanne Froggatt, movie star Billy Howle, and actor Samuel Barnett.

Our 2022 show Constellations featured a breathtaking 1.5 miles of colour-changing fibre optic cables, designed by TK Hay, who went on to win **Best Designer** at that year's Stage Debut Awards.

The Woman in Black was first staged here in 1987 as a low-budget Christmas ghost story for Scarborough audiences, later transferring to the West End, where it became one of London theatre's longest-running plays.

Actor James Norton came to the SJT on work experience as a child and has since called it "a beacon of excellence in my home county", crediting his time with us for sparking his love of theatre. In September 2023, he became our patron.

Emmy, BAFTA, and Golden Globe-winning actor Jodie Comer made her professional stage debut at the SJT, starring in Fiona Evans' The Price of Everything.

Harold Pinter made his directing debut with The Birthday Party at the Library Theatre, our first home, with a cast including a young Alan Ayckbourn.

Other famous names who worked here include **Andrew Lloyd Webber**, Tim Firth, **Michael Gambon**, Janie Dee, Martin **Freeman**, Tamzin Outhwaite, Lenny Henry, **Julie Hesmondhalgh** and **Claire Skinner**.

We're credited with being the first theatre in the UK to install a mesh ceiling, often referred to as a "trampoline" mesh - look up next time you're in the Round and you'll see it!

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
