# **And Then Come The Nightjars**



A new movie directed by our very own Artistic Director, Paul Robinson, can be seen in our cinema next month.

And Then Come The Nightjars will be on our silver screen on Friday 22 September at 7.45pm, and Saturday 23 September at 2.45pm and 7.45pm, following its world premiere at the Chichester International Film Festival on 25 August. The Saturday evening screening will be followed by a Q&A with Paul Robinson, led by George Cromack. Tickets for the screenings are usually £7, but as a Circle member, you can use the discount Nightjars5 to get a ticket for just £5 for the Saturday evening.

The film was adapted from the original play by its writer, Bea Roberts. The stage version was the last play to be directed by Paul Robinson at Theatre503, where he was Artistic Director until he joined us in 2016. It toured to the SJT in the autumn of that year.

Set against a backdrop of the 2001 Foot and Mouth outbreak, it tells the story of an unlikely friendship between a Devon farmer and the vet who is assigned to cull his precious herd. In this new film version from Finite Films and TV, Nigel Hastings and David Fielder reprise their successful on-stage roles as Jeff and Michael, with Paul Robinson making his feature film directorial debut.

Paul says: "It was a dream come true when Finite Films approached me to direct this beautiful story. We shot it on location in Devon, on a farm which was impacted by Foot and Mouth, so that made it even more important to get right. It was a terrifying experience but also one which I relished every moment of. I had the most fantastic team – cinematographer John Craine, editor Claire Pringle and composer Simon Slater – who supported me all the way, and I really think we've got something quite special. I'm certainly delighted to have captured those incredible performances on screen.

"It was an audience favourite on stage and I'm really hoping for the same response to the film."

## **Backstage secrets**



In the latest of our series of backstage secrets, our Company Stage Manager, Fleur Beeley, writes:

Is it a bird? Is it a plane? Nope, it's a well-known breakfast cereal!

You will all have seen many things falling from the ceiling in the Round at the SJT, from dust to snow, petals to slime. And whatever drops from the ceiling has to be non-slip, safe and nontoxic.

Petals are usually made of material; this gives them a wonderful flutter as they fall to the stage. Different sizes and colours make a multitude of different petals.

Snow and ash are recycled from polythene bags or paper, ripped into tiny pieces. White for snow, black and grey for ash, they all come in different sizes to give different effects and with some cunning mixing together can make all sorts of effects.

Slime is a tricky beast: getting the consistency right so it doesn't (a) fall like a bowling ball or (b) splatter the front row from head to toe can involve a lot of trial and error.

In Treasure Island, we ended up putting an actor underneath it on a very large flag to break its fall and make clean up easier. Although getting it out of his costume was no mean feat every show – twice on Thursdays and Saturdays!

In The 39 Steps a character shoots a pistol in the air inside a theatre. To give this some reality, the director and designer asked for a dust drop as if it had punctured the roof. That in itself is quite easy: a tippable box and a piece of string, or a box with a magnetized lid that can be released through the lighting board. But what to put in it, that isn't a hazard to walk on, or dangerous to breathe in? All things we have to think about around actors doing the show eight times a week – one slip or choke and we can have a cancellation on our hands.

The answer? The humble Weetabix, crushed to a suitable powder, or left in larger lumps, makes a great plaster and dust drop.

So, next time you see something coming from the sky at the SJT, have a wonder what it's made of and how it's released on cue!
