Dracula is absolutely fang-tastic and that's the Bloody Truth!

We've stolen our headline from the Manchester Theatres website following the press night of our next show, <u>Dracula: The Bloody Truth</u>. Along with other reviewers, they saw it at our coproducer, the Octagon Theatre Bolton, earlier this month – it's flying our way from 3 to 27 July.



The Manchester outlet gave the show fourand-a-half stars, adding that it's "pure, unadulterated farce of the highest order", "so much fun", "a combination of irreverence, silliness and eccentricity that had me – and the rest of the audience – laughing out loud" and "a great evening's entertainment that I can heartily recommend!".

They weren't alone in loving the show. The British Theatre Guide found it "very funny" and had high praise for the cast, calling them "exceptional physical comedians" in "an affectionate tribute to theatre... performed by a committed and highly skilled cast". (Top) hats off to actors Chris Hannon, Annie Kirkman, Alyce Liburd and Killian Macardle!

Theatre Reviews North awarded it five stars, calling it a "funny, witty, fast paced physical production" and advising readers "for some bloody good fun, get on your hearse and fly to the Octagon" (Or in your case, the SJT!).

Here4You magazine was also enthusiastic, describing the show as "comedy at its best... a two-hour hurricane of totally compelling theatre".

One of our favourite reviews was in The Bury Times: "Dracula: The Bloody Truth is silly, unashamedly silly, gloriously silly. This production is a hoot from start to finish and will see you leave the theatre with a giant smile on your face."

You're probably getting the picture by now, but just in case, here's what The Stage had to say about this "very funny" production:

"Audiences will be coming to be entertained rather than for a faithful adaptation of Stoker's tale. Helen Coyston's set – with periodaccurate furniture slowly being destroyed and replaced by whatever scenery the cast finds lying around – and sound designer Simon Slater's comedically misfiring sound cues completely deliver on that front, as does the committed cast."



Absurd Person Singular



A long-lost radio recording of one of Alan Ayckbourn's most popular shows, *Absurd Person Singular*, has resurfaced and is currently available online as part of BBC Radio 4's *Hidden Treasures* project, which rediscovers recordings returned to Auntie by collectors.

First broadcast in March 1977, it stars SJT favourite Christopher Godwin as Sidney Hopcroft – something of a role reversal, as Chris originated the role of Sidney's nemesis, Ronald Brewster-Wright, in the original stage production at the Library in 1972. He returned to the SJT in 2022 to play Ronald again in our Ayckbourn gala weekend, which featured a reading of Absurd Person Singular to celebrate its 50th anniversary.

Other parts in the radio recording are played by Frances Jeater (a member of our summer company in 1989, appearing in *The Revengers' Comedies* and *June Moon*), Jane Knowles, John Rowe, Stephen Murray and Judy Parfitt (Sister Monica Joan in the enormously popular *Call the Midwife*).

And two characters usually heard but not seen, the infamous Dick and Lottie, are here elevated to main cast – this is radio, after all! They're played by Leslie Heritage and Sheila Butler.

The BBC website calls it "one of Alan Ayckbourn's funniest plays", adding: "Ayckbourn is one of the most successful comedy writers in the theatre and this play – like most classic comedies – reveals not only his wit but also the wicked and dark observations behind his humour."

Paul Todd

We were saddened to hear of the death recently of Paul Todd, musical director at the Stephen Joseph Theatre in its Westwood days, from 1978 to 1988. Paul worked extensively with Alan Ayckbourn, as either composer or musical director, on many shows including the original productions of A Chorus of Disapproval, Woman in Mind, Way Upstream and Season's Greetings.

Alan's Archivist, Simon Murgatroyd, remembers: "Paul wrote nine musical revues and two musicals with Alan. He was also responsible for introducing lunchtime and latenight concerts at Westwood – and the rock nights! Those wonderful evenings in the studio where much beer was slopped (looking back, they probably weren't recalled that fondly by the cleaning staff)."

"He also created that incredible final sampled composition for Henceforward... long before most of us knew what sampling was. I still recall it vividly and the astonishing effect it had on the audiences. One of my great theatre moments!"

Paul subsequently went on to work as a musical director at the National Theatre, and also published a book for children. He remained a great supporter of the SJT – our Facebook page won't seem the same without his regular comments, usually sending us lots of kisses.



Dates for your diary

Thursday 26 September: The Show & Tell company – the 90th play from the pen of our Director Emeritus, who turns 85 in April – he doesn't do things by halves...

Thursday 31 October: The Whitby Rebels company – you may remember the almost unbelievable story of Captain Jack Lammiman, the Whitby skipper who in 1991 set off from Whitby Harbour with a very motley crew to place a plaque on an Arctic island honouring whaling captain William Scoresby. This affectionate retelling of the story is by Bea Roberts.

Thursday 14 November: The visiting *Perfect Pitch* company will join us this morning to talk about working with John Godber and, of course, camping and caravanning.

Thursday 12 December (time TBC, but this will be an afternoon event as the cast will be on stage in the morning): The Aladdin company – our annual visit to the strange and wonderful brain of Nick Lane as he retells a traditional tale in his own inimitable style.
