It's Christmaaaaaaaaaaaassssss.....!

It really is (almost) the most wonderful time of the year here at the SJT – we just love Christmas, and to prove it we bring you not just one, but TWO fabulous festive shows!

Rehearsals are going strong for **Thor's Great Big Adventure** (12 - 23 December) and nearly over for **Beauty and the Beast** (1-30 December) as we get ready to open on Friday: just look at these faces ready to entertain with thrills, silliness, adventure, and ALL the festive sparkle!

And still they come...

This is (probably – we always like to keep our options open!) our last announcement of 2023 – enjoy some more visiting shows for 2024, although there'll be more to follow in the New Year, of course.

As a valued Circle member, you have priority booking from 10am on Friday 1 December until 10am on Wednesday 6 December, when the shows will go on sale to the general public. They are:

Self-Raising (20 & 21 February): "It starts with a secret, but this one's different, this one's mine." Award-winning Artistic Director of Graeae, Jenny Sealey has spent a lifetime championing stories by Deaf and disabled artists. Now she takes to the stage to tell her own story. Unravelling the past and facing the future, Self-Raising is a blisteringly honest, laugh-out-loud onewoman show about growing up deaf in a family with secrets.



Queer Spaces: Live! (22 February): Presented by Roots, in association with the SJT and York Theatre Royal. Toffs nightclub in York on a Sunday night; the sweaty corners of London's Royal Vauxhall Tavern; the house-share moved into after a bad break-up; virtually all of Brighton; countless bookshops. When writing about queer sanctuaries, these were novelist Natasha Bell's choices. Inspired by Natasha's blog, Roots has invited Yorkshire artists to share their stories for a one-off celebration of queer lives that is joyful and real.

Henry Normal: Everything and More (25 April): Poet, writer and producer – he co-created *The Royle Family* and co-wrote the first series, and has worked extensively with Steve Coogan – Henry says: "I usually pick a topic for each tour. In this new show I'm concentrating on everything. Jokes, poems and stories, digging deep into the subject of every single thing in the universe and beyond."



DNA (8 - 11 May): So there's this group of teenagers, and they've done something bad... really bad, and now they're panicking and desperately trying to cover it up, but when they find that the cover-up is actually bringing them together in their need to be a part of something more, maybe it isn't all so bad after all? Dennis Kelly's dark comedy is the inaugural production from the SJT's Young Company. Come and see the next generation of acting talent.

Making Waves (18 May): York Dance Space and partners brings you an evening of dance! Professional dance artists and community groups will leap onto the stage for Making Waves, showcasing new dance work accompanied by original music composed by North Yorkshire Composer Wilfred Kimber.

Among the line up is BBC Young Dance finalist Maiya Leek and Yorkshire based dance Company Northern Rascals, celebrating the breadth of community dance across North Yorkshire and showcasing the vibrant and diverse communities of the region.

Richard Herring: Can I Have My Ball Back? (23 May): In 2021 Richard Herring went to his GP to find out why his right ball seemed to be growing bigger. It turned out that he had testicular cancer and one month later he was lying in hospital waiting to have his murderous gonad removed. Would he survive? (No spoilers!). In his much-anticipated return to stand-up after six years, Richard talks bollocks and answers the question on everyone's lips: Is a severed gonad in a jar a fitting prize to bring in for Taskmaster?





Tony Skingle: The Best of the Elvis '68
Comeback Special (26 May): Tony Skingle returns to the Round with the show that sold out last year, bringing together sections of the '68 Comeback Special and the Vegas years, all performed in his own unique way. Tony is one of the UK's best Elvis tribute acts, based in Scarborough and performing all over the world.

There Was an Old Lady Who Swallowed a Fly (28 May): I don't know why she swallowed a fly... But The People's Theatre Company does! And now you can too as they bring this muchloved story to life with live action, animation and puppetry.

Seriously Collins (1 June): Get ready to be transported back in time to relive the legendary hits of Phil Collins and Genesis! "Seriously Collins" is not just a tribute show; it's an electrifying journey through the music that touched hearts and defined an era.

Alfie Moore: A Face for Radio (14 & 15 June): Thirty years of shift-work, and being punched in the face, had left 'Fair Cop' Alfie with a 'face for radio'. A face not so much 'lived in' as inhabited by squatters with little regard to property maintenance! A surprising career shift turned middle-aged Alfie from street cop to BBC radio star. But when TV fame beckoned could he grasp it or was he past it?

The Elton John Show (22 June): With over 300 million records sold, Sir Elton John is the most successful singer-songwriter of his generation. This tribute show brings young Elton back to the stage at his energetic best – and we urge you to watch the trailer, on our website now, to see just how good it sounds!

Backstage secrets

More insider info from our Company Stage Manager, Fleur Beeley:

Quick question: do you know that you can get smoke in a can? Do you know that you can get really strong magnets that can be sewn into clothing to use as quick-release fasteners? Do you know what the rubber stopper on the end of a walking stick is called? Did you know that we use fishing line, an almost invisible substance that comes in different strengths, to trigger tricks or effects without being seen (think the blind in The 39 Steps)? How would you go about making a small Christmas tree drive itself onstage, on cue? How do you make a glass of wine change colour onstage? How do you make a china bowl that can be 'eaten' by an actor onstage? How do you turn a bright pink Duracell bunny into a drumming vintage teddy bear? How do you make bottles of liquid bubble on cue? The questions go on and on.

All of the above are challenges that we've had to deal with over the years. Everything (well, almost everything!) is possible, with collaboration, ingenuity, and some sideways thinking. At the SJT, we have the most amazing selection of minds, all of which know different things to each other. It's very rare that we can't come up with a solution to a problem between us, and most of the time it's the simplest way of doing it that's the most effective. It's what we call 'string technology'.

I've said it before, and I'll say it again: every day is a learning day. We learn new skills all the time: sewing, casting, woodworking, die cutting, painting, origami, knitting, making fish that can be thrown (Thor's Great Big Adventure in the Mac this Christmas!), re-caning chairs, covering cushions, making a pair of maracas look like mini Santa Clauses (Beauty and the Beast this Christmas), printing (including a full book for Beauty and the Beast) – blink and you'll miss them!!

I look forward every day to coming to work to find out what I can learn from my colleagues, and from the internet!
