Last Rites (8 February): One man has twenty-four hours to perform his father's funeral rites. This intimate, final ceremony brings to life a rich tapestry of shared memories and a complex relationship cut short by death. A powerful journey of love, loss, and what it means to be a parent from award-winning theatre company Ad Infinitum.



Miles Jupp: On I Bang (17 February): Since Miles's last tour finished at the London Palladium in 2017, he's appeared regularly on TV and radio, and published a novel. Know, Only Yesterday and more!


The Carpenters Experience (7 June):

Here's what's to look out for:

The Hidden Garden (1 November):


Hidden amongst the concrete highrises and redbrick buildings is something
unexpected: a place bursting with colour,
where flowers, fruit and vegetables come
to life in every corner. A curious child
discovers this hidden garden and meets the
man who's created his own little paradise
to brighten up the grey and feed those for
whom hunger is never far away. A magical
tale of a blooming unlikely friendship for
children age 5+ and their grown-ups.



SealSkin (6 November): Every full moon the Selkies appear, peeling away their seal skin, dancing freely in the moonlight. One night, a fisherman discovers their secret, and betrayal and consequences follow... SealSkin combines Tmesis' trademark playful and highly skilled physicality, puppetry, storytelling, incredible projection design and live original music from acoustic duo Me + Deboe.

The Retro Rock Show (9 November): A retro musical journey featuring songs by Queen, Fleetwood Mac, Starship, Van Halen, Heart, Roxette, Whitesnake, Def Leppard, Toto, Iron Maiden, Berlin, and many more, featuring Kerry O'Dowd from BBC's The Voice UK on lead vocals.

Perfect Pitch (13 to 16 November): When teacher Matt borrows his parent's caravan to head to the Yorkshire coast with partner Rose, they're expecting four days of total de-stress. Chantell Walker

We're delighted to welcome our new Associate Director, Chantell Walker, to the SJT family!

Originally from Sheffield, Chantell trained at the Liverpool Everyman & Playhouse Theatres and her work has been performed at many regional theatres in the North. She's been directing for several years, mostly working on new writing with a passion for fresh and inspiring stories.

Chantell is from a working-class background and had very little access to the arts growing up; by the age of 16 she'd seen just one play. She spent most of her time as a teenager in the boxing ring and competed in high-level contests before pursuing a career in directing. She still coaches boxing today.

Chantell says: "I feel extremely lucky and honoured to be the next Associate Director at the SJT. Over the next 18 months, I'll learn about how a regional theatre operates, strengthen my directing and leadership skills, connect to local creatives and communities in Scarborough and be a part of the SJT team at this incredible theatre.

"I feel a real connection to regional theatres and how they connect to their communities through the stories shared on their stages and creative engagement: I'm really passionate about connecting to people from all different backgrounds and believe theatre should be accessible for everyone. I can't wait to see where this journey with the SJT takes me!"

The SJT's Artistic Director Paul Robinson says:

"The Associate Director role is an invaluable training opportunity and an equally invaluable asset for the SJT. Chantell will be our fourth Associate on the scheme, which has seen previous recipients go on to run regional theatres and have hugely successful careers."



During her 18-month tenure, Chantell will gain an insight into what it's like to be an artistic director, spending time with all departments including producing, programming, literary, talent development, creative engagement, marketing, production and fundraising. She'll benefit from mentorship from Paul Robinson, be Associate Director on at least two SJT-produced shows, work with the theatre's partnership degree at Coventry University Scarborough, develop young talent and direct a creative engagement production.

Her previous credits include Jane
Hair - The Brontes Restyled (Buglight
Theatre), Sophie (Hiding Place
Theatre), Signs (HerProductions), Dancing
Out (HerProductions), Bottleneck (Hiding
Place Theatre), In Wonderland (Young
Everyman & Playhouse), A Taste of
Honey (Salford Arts Theatre) and Orphans
(Young Everyman & Playhouse).

Some of you will have met Chantell's predecessors in the role: Lotte Wakeham, now Artistic Director at the Octagon Theatre Bolton; Chelsey Gillard, now Artistic Director at the Torch Theatre in Milford Haven and Kash Arshad, a successful freelance director – he's currently busy directing Theatre by the Lake's Christmas show, The Jungle Book!

Spotlight on... John Godber's Perfect Pitch

Back in 1997, Alan Ayckbourn had a big idea for our 1998 summer season – we'd put on ten new plays, by ten different authors, all performed by (guess what?) a company of ten actors.

The 10 by 10 season was billed as 'an exciting an innovative repertoire of ten world or UK premieres', led by three brand new comedies by three of the country's most successful writers – Alan himself (Comic Potential), Tim Firth (Love Songs for Shopkeepers) and John Godber (Perfect Pitch).

At the time, we all took it in our stride – we were used to Alan's crazy ideas and just ran with them. In retrospect, it feels



extraordinary that we had three writers of their calibre working alongside each other in a season that lasted just four months. (And let's not forget that they were joined by seven others, with five lunchtime shows by Steve Carley, Stuart Fortey, Michael Fosbrook, Neil Monaghan and Robert Shearman, and two late nights by Michael Gow and AR Gurney).

It was a chaotic summer season – the brochure tells us that: "By the height of the summer, the three main house shows will leapfrog one another. There will be two playing most weeks – or even two a day on selected Saturdays!"

John Godber's <u>Perfect Pitch</u> proved hugely popular – hardly surprising considering it was enticingly billed as 'a funny and touching tale of brooding sexuality and chemical toilets.'

The play was performed by SJT favourite John Branwell and Jennifer Luckraft as Grant and Steph, alongside, as Ron and Yvonne, James Hornsby and none other than Jacqueline King – currently on our stage in **The Whitby Rebels**.

John has somewhat tweaked the story for the 21st century. Originally, Ron and Yvonne were an early-retired head teacher and his keep-fit-mad wife – 'a little bit dull, a little bit snobbish', according to one critic. First-time campers trying out their shiny new caravan on a Scarborough campsite, they have their weekend upended by the arrival of Grant and Steph, the 'caravanners from hell'.

Now teacher Matt and his partner Rose have borrowed his parent's caravan, hoping for a long weekend of total de-stress on the Yorkshire coast. But with a Tribfest taking place nearby, Grant and Steph's pop-up tent is an unwelcome addition to their perfect pitch.

Why has John updated it? Well, it's been described more than once as a state-of-thenation play, and the state of the nation has changed beyond recognition in the last quarter-century. We can only wait and see how much **Perfect Pitch** has changed...

Backstage secrets - The Whitby Rebels

Our Company Stage Manager, Fleur Beeley, writes:

Port is left, starboard is right, right? Yes, but you also need to know which way you are facing on the boat.

I used to sail when I was about 14 or 15, togged up and placed on a Flying Fifteen (a type of sailing boat), only told I was in a race once we were out on the water.

"Have you ever used a spinnaker?" asked the skip. "No," I replied. "Well, you're about to learn, and fast!"

I never thought nearly 40 years later I'd be dragging up what few sailing terms I'd picked up in passing to do a show, based on a true story, of a group of misfits who sailed to the North Pole!!

Suddenly everyone is talking about the windlass, galley, bowsprit. The bow (also known as the stern), the stern, masts, booms and jibs. Cleats, gunwales, capstan, scuppers: the list goes on.

Now, I'm sure all of you know some of these terms, but there are many things onboard that have many names meaning the same thing. We had a slightly heated discussion about rope onboard. I thought it was called a sheet, while others were determined it was called a line. Turns out we were both right, they're just on different bits of the boat doing different jobs! They can also be called halyards, sheets, brails, vangs, tricing lines, warps, whips and jackstays. So, it's not surprising we've been slightly confused by the terminology, when it's used, on what size of boat, in what situation.

Thankfully we haven't got into a shroud, boomvang, luff, leech, telltale or a spreader. If you dig deeper you get into the realms of baggywrinkle, gollywobler, orlop, scuttlebutt and burge. These are all real terms: you can have a Google if you don't believe me.

Oh, and port and starboard are worked out from you facing the front of the boat. So, as the sailors say: fair winds and following seas. If you weigh anchor, I hope you have your sea legs and fair passage to you all!
