As ever, it will be the usual anarchic fun from one of our favourite writers, Nick Lane, directed by one of our favourite directors, Paul Robinson and – you've guessed it! – designed by one of our favourite designers, Helen Coyston.

Throw into that mix five fantastically talented performers – Oliver Mawdsley, who many of you will remember as Dromio in this spring's The Comedy of Errors (more or less), and four newto-us faces (Amy Drake, Annie Kirkman, Kiara Nicole Pillai, Charlie Ryan) – and we'll be cooking up a real festive treat!

Yet MORE new shows!

Yet more exciting visiting shows for 2024 – and as a valued Circle member, you have priority booking from 10am on Friday 27 October until 10am on Wednesday 1 November, when the shows will go on sale to the general public. They are:

As SHE Likes It (31 January): Kiss the Hollywood happy ending goodbye! As SHE Likes It is inspired by the story of #MeToo pioneer Patricia Douglas. A darkly comedic explosion of multimedia, verbatim, cabaret and drag; a contemporary Brechtian-style play that poses the question: How much has changed between the Hollywood of yesteryear and now?

Barrie Rutter OBE – Shakepeare's Royals

(1 March): Join Barrie Rutter OBE tocelebrate the Bard's kings and queens – their achievements, conquests and foibles – with anecdotes and memories from a career of playing and directing Shakespeare's royals.

Lines (23 March): What connects five prisons over five decades in Uganda, Palestine and the UK? A homeowner struggling to keep ancient land. A queer woman teaching in Kampala. The son of Idi Amin's general. Lines looks through the bars of postcolonial life as told through stories in these diverging yet parallel worlds. Produced by Roots Mbili Theatre and Remote Theatre Project.

Flat & the Curves (26 April): After a sell-out show at the SJT in 2023, the award-winning powerhouse girl-band are back with their critically acclaimed, glittery cabaret of unbridled fun! Expect riotous original songs that address the feminine zeitgeist; calling on exceptional vocal ability to tackle some of life's big issues – no subject is off-limits! Expect big voices and bold statements in an evening of hilarity and full-frontal vulgarity.

<u>Sam Jewison</u> (27 April): Sam returns to us for one night only! His acclaimed interpretation of the Great American Songbook uniquely fuses elements of jazz, classical, and popular music in a captivating display of artistry: expect to hear new treatments of songs from the classic Broadway stage, Hollywood screen and golden age of American popular music. Frozen Light: The Bar at the Edge of Time (30

April and 1 May): Frozen Light creates exciting and original multi-sensory theatre for audiences with profound and multiple learning disabilities (PMLD) and tours it to venues nationwide. The glasses are polished, the lights are down low, and time will be hopping. The Bar at the Edge of Time waits only for you, so what are you waiting for?

Luke Wright's Silver Jubilee (15 May): Crack out the bunting! Over 25 years, Luke Wright has built up a reputation as one of Britain's most popular live poets. This year he tries to celebrate his jubilee but ends up taking a deep dive into himself, throwing up questions about class, privilege and his adoption. An Edinburgh Fringe smash hit.

Ria Lina: Riawakening (19 June): In the aftermath of a global pandemic, comedian and scientist Ria Lina has had a Riawakening and sees the world differently. In her highly anticipated debut tour, Ria tackles coming out of a global pandemic, the new normal, divorce, dating in a new digital world, motherhood and what it really means to be a woman today.

November shows

As the nights inexorably draw in, resolve not to become a couch potato – instead treat yourself to a great night (or afternoon) out at the theatre (preferably ours!). We've got something for just about everyone this month, starting with family show <u>I Believe in Unicorns.</u> (2 and 3 November). This show has an amazing pedigree – based on the book by Michael 'Warhorse' Morpurgo, it's performed by one of the country's leading storytellers, Danyah Miller.

It's followed on 6 November by <u>You Heard Me</u>. Written and performed by Luca Rutherford, this is a true story about refusing to stay quiet and the power to re-make, re-mould and disrupt. This show exists because without using her voice, Luca wouldn't.

On 8 and 9 November, we welcome to the SJT for the first time comedian and writer Mark Thomas in <u>England & Son</u>: a stunning one-man show where capitalism, empire, stolen youth and stolen wealth merge into the simple tale of a working-class boy who just wants his dad to smile at him, fresh from a sell-out run at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe where it won five awards including the prestigious Fringe First award from *The Scotsman*.

And on 13 November, we welcome back old friends Tavaziva Dance with their new show, **Boy's Khaya**. Powerfully moving and personal, this account of choreographer Bawren Tavaziva's early life in Zimbabwe is told through a mesmerising combination of contemporary, ballet and African dance, with a spoken-word soundtrack and music.

Added to that is a quartet of shows for which we advise you to get your skates on if you want to see them: Swinging at the Cotton Club (10 November) is sold out, but you can ask our box office to add you to the waiting list; while <u>Sinatra: RAW</u> (16 November); <u>The</u> <u>Pretend Beatles</u> (18 November), <u>Buddy Holly</u> (13 December) and <u>Bridget Christie: Who Am I?</u> (23 November) are all on limited availability at time of writing.

The only nationwide awards to celebrate outstanding achievements in theatre across the UK, the awards were announced at a ceremony London's historic Guildhall earlier this month, attended by our joint chief execs, Paul Robinson and Caroline Routh.

Antony couldn't be there, but sent a lovely speech to be read by his fellow *Family Album* company members Jude Deeno and David Lomond (who played the removal men), who also accepted the award on his behalf.

We thought you might enjoy it in all its glory!

"Thanks for this. I'm sorry I can't be here today but I am sadly (actually smugly) on my honeymoon. A quietly wise man once said it was a grave mistake to think theatre was better just because it happened in London. That has always rung true for me because we are lucky enough

in this country to have a thirst for theatre in our bones. Regional theatre doesn't need to rely on the celebrity zoo in the way London does and so the best theatre that this country has to offer is the true ensemble-driven theatre to be found regionally.

"The Stephen Joseph Theatre In Scarborough is a shining example of excellence in that regard, in my opinion the most important theatre for new writing in the country and I'd like to thank Paul and Caroline at the SJT for keeping that fire burning; my agent James Ireson at Narrow Road for constantly fighting the good fight and of course, that quietly wise man who, after being inspired by his words and his plays, I've been lucky enough to work with.
